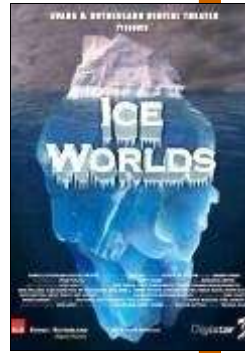
Freedom Over Texas Presented by Shell

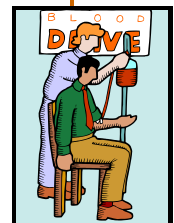

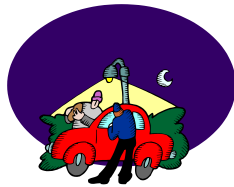

How to Pack a Picnic Basket

1. Start with a fully loaded picnic basket or pack that comes with the following essential picnic items: plates, utensils, cups, cloth napkins and an insulated cooler.
2. Place the items you will need last, such as trash bags and antibacterial wipes, in the bottom of the picnic basket or pack.
3. Pack the food in water-tight, reusable plastic containers.
4. Line the bottom of the cooler with ice or a cold pack.
5. Put the plastic containers of food in the bottom of the cooler.
6. Scatter ice or cold packs around the food and place beverages on top.
7. Place the cooler in the picnic basket or pack, with a picnic blanket on top.
8. Put small items such as insect repellent, sunscreen and sunglasses on top of the picnic blanket.



Things You'll Need:

- Picnic Basket or Picnic Pack
- Paper Towels & Antibacterial Wipes
- Trash Bags
- Ice or Cold Packs
- Reusable Plastic Containers w/ Lids
- Food
- Beverages
- Picnic Basket

*Placing warm foods in the cooler will cause the ice to melt, increasing the chance of food spoilage.

ALL STAR CHILI HOT DOGS

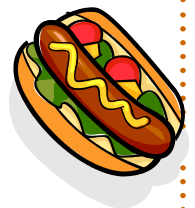
July is National Hot Dog Month! The National Hot Dog & Sausage Council estimates that Americans eat 7 billion hot dogs during the summer months (Memorial Day to Labor Day). On average, that's 818 hot dogs per second. (Who knew there was a National Hot Dog & Sausage Council...)

Ingredients:

- 3/4 pound ground beef
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1 8-ounce can tomato sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon chili powder
- 8 hot dog buns, split and lightly toasted
- Cheddar cheese, shredded (optional)
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 teaspoon brown sugar
- 8 hot dogs, cooked according to package directions
- Chili sauce

Directions:

1. In a medium skillet, over medium heat, brown beef and onions, breaking up beef into small pieces. Drain fat from skillet. Reduce heat to low.
2. Stir in tomato, Worcestershire and hot pepper sauces, chili powder, salt and pepper and sugar. Simmer for about 10 to 12 minutes, stirring occasionally.
3. Place cooked hot dogs into toasted buns. Ladle 1/4 cup chili sauce over each hot dog. If desired, top with

Workplace Wisdom

Watch your language at work

You can damage your career by saying the wrong thing to your boss. No, not, “You’re an idiot,” or, “Do I look like I care?” Career adviser Karen Burns warns employees to avoid these all-too-common statements:

- **“That’s not my job.”** Don’t limit yourself to what’s in your job description. Be willing to take on any role the boss asks you to (assuming it’s legal and ethical, of course). You can ask your boss why he or she is assigning the task to you, but you’ll improve your career prospects by accepting whatever assignment is thrown your way.
- **“It’s not my problem.”** Don’t let the boss think you don’t care what happens to the company you work for. Take responsibility for fixing things so your manager can rely on you no matter what.
- **“It’s not my fault.”** Ducking responsibility only makes you look and sound untrustworthy. Don’t waste your time—and your boss’s time—on assigning blame for whatever problems the company faces. Focus on finding solutions.
- **“I can’t do that—it’s impossible.”** Insisting your boss is asking for the impossible won’t endear you to management. You want your boss to believe you can do whatever’s required. Analyze the “impossible” task and identify the real problem or goal; then concentrate on overcoming the obstacles.
